Memorial Park Master Plan

Your feedback is requested for the future of Downtown and Memorial Park!

District Council has identified 'Downtown Vibrancy' as one of their core strategic priorities for the 2018-2022 elected term. One of the top initiatives under this strategic goal is the development of a new and revitalized 'Downtown Neighbourhood Action Plan' (DNAP) for Summerland. The Kelowna based firm, Urban Systems, is collaborating with District staff as a consultant on the project.

Work is underway on re-imagining Summerland's



Downtown. The process includes developing a clear Vision as a basis to promote desired neighbourhood vibrancy and preparing a Master Plan for Memorial Park to revitalize the space as a community focal point.

Consultation with District staff and various stakeholders has resulted in two concept options for Memorial Park, both of which incorporate a range of spaces and activities for people Sidewalk clearing of all ages and abilities, as well as a Draft Vision for the entire Downtown neighbourhood.

2022 Utility rate increases

In order to meet Council's strategic priority to sustainably finance the District's future asset replacements, as well as to strengthen capital reserve levels and keep pace with operational inflationary increases, residents will see a 5.0% increase in water rates, a 4.21% increase in sewer rates and a 2.51% increase in electric rates. All rate increases are effective January 1, 2022.

Public Council Meetings were held regarding utility rates as well as an open house, prior to the adoption of these increases.

A <u>typical</u> single-family home will see <u>annual</u> utility increases in 2022 of approximately:

Sewer \$17.80 Water \$41.43

Energy savings for hot water

Use these tips to yield hot water savings throughout the the year:

- Take more showers than baths;
- shorten your showers;
- install aerating, low-flow faucets and showerheads;
- repair leaky faucets;
- turn your water heater temperature down 5°C;
- insulate the first 2m of the hot water pipes and the first 1m of cold water pipes connected to the water heater;
- wash and rinse your clothes in cold water; and
- consider buying an ENERGY STAR® qualified, water-

Municipal bylaws require that you remove the snow and ice from public footpaths and sidewalks bordering your property (business or residential).



Any snow or ice that accumulates on residential property must be cleared within 24 hours after the snow event ends. Commercial zoned sidewalks must be cleared from all snow and ice no later than 10:00 AM each day.

Isintok Dam Outlet Pipe Replacement Project

The Isintok Dam Outlet Pipe Replacement project has progressed very well and is near completion. The District lowered the reservoir water level in June and July and worked with First Nations, Department of Fisheries and Oceans, and Environmental Consultants to limit fish stranding and to monitor water quality in the remaining ponds.

The project began with upgrades to the access road; including road widening and installation of new culverts to improve drainage. The contractor then excavated through the width of the dam, removing the old concrete pipe and the intake and outfall structures. Once excavated, geotechnical information was used to assess the feasibility of raising the dam in the future and to assist in future spillway widening, required to



meet Dam Safety Regulations. Installation then began on the new 48-inch, high density polyethylene pipe (HDPE), and pouring concrete for the intake, outfall, and gate control structures. Geotextile fabric and rip rap were installed on the front face of the dam for erosion protection.

The Isintok Outlet Pipe Replacement project replaced the leaking infrastructure that was beyond its service life, that may have caused significant damage to the dam structure. The new outlet pipe provides flood resilience, brings the structure

Dog licence renewal

Dog Licence renewals have now been sent for 2022 and are **due by January 31.** If you did not receive your renewal in the mail or if you no longer require a licence, please call municipal hall at

All dogs in Summerland must be licensed by the age of 4 months. Having a licence is the best way to ensure a lost dog is returned. Unless you are authorized to run a kennel, no more than three dogs are allowed per household.

Dogs must always be leashed in a public place and secured/fenced or tethered while in a building, on property or in a vehicle. They can run freely at the temporary off-leash dog park at Dale Meadows anytime or at Peach Orchard Beach Park from October to April.
