It has been another intense wildfire season with thousands of fires in both BC and Alberta burning more than a million hectares of forest. The Jasper wildfire was unprecedented yet 70% of the townsite was saved thanks to the commitment of the firefighters as well as the FireSmart program put in place to help protect the community. Similarly, mitigation work conducted by the Penticton Indian Band helped firefighters prevent the spread of the recent wildfire above West Bench. Sixteen homes were evacuated but ultimately only two sheds were lost.

The District of Summerland has undertaken its own fuel modifications in interface areas such as the Trappers area, Deer Ridge, Sunset Place, Canyon View, Garnet Valley, and Giant's Head Mountain. Mitigation work is guided by a Community Wildfire Protection Plan and involves thinning, spacing and pruning trees as well as removing needles and rotted wood from the forest floor. Prescribed burns can also help rid the forest of dead leaves, tree limbs and other debris.

The District has received \$875,000 in provincial grants over the past five years to help with wildfire mitigation and recently the Forest Enhancement Society of British Columbia (FESBC) provided an additional \$495,000 for mitigation work on Crown lands around Summerland.

Combustible materials are also found on private properties and several neighbourhoods (Deer Ridge, Cartwright Road North, Sumac Ridge) have taken action to reduce their vulnerability by becoming national FireSmart Recognized Neighbourhoods. It's important for all homeowners to protect their properties by clearing brush one metre from around buildings, on roofs and in gutters. By taking proactive steps to protect our properties, we can all play a part in keeping Summerland safe.

#### Keeping your cart clean

collection.

Many residents have tried putting their food scraps directly into their green cart. This is allowed but can make a sticky mess inside the cart. Here are some helpful tips:

- Always wait until the day of collection to discard food scraps. If you place food scraps all week long, especially in the summer, it will create strong smells. These smells will attract animals and promote the growth of bugs in your cart. Keep food scraps stored indoors and place out only on the day of
- Think about freezing food scraps or keeping them in the fridge in a sealed container. If you don't have space for all food scraps, just keep the stinky stuff cold. Use a yogurt container with lid or some other recyclable container and empty food scrap contents on your day of collection.
- Use a paper liner when placing in the cart. This can be a piece of newspaper, a normal paper bag or a lined compostable paper bag. Plastic bags, including those marked compostable, are not permitted to be composted in British Columbia.
- If you have yard waste, including grass, prunings or weeds, place the yard waste on the bottom of the cart. You can then layer more yard waste on top of any food scraps to keep odours down.

# Ongoing and upcoming projects

- Victoria Road South Storm Drainage Upgrade The first phase of road and storm system upgrades from Agur Street to Dunham Crescent have been completed. The next phase of this project involves resurfacing the road and constructing a multi-use pathway from Dunham Crescent to the oval-a-bout that connects Victoria Road to Prairie Valley Road. This project is currently in the design stage, with construction anticipated in 2025.
- Giant's Head Mountain Park Phases 3 and 4 Road and parking lot upgrades are complete. Finishing touches to the new washroom building located at the entrance gate are in progress. Planting, seeding and restoration work will continue into the fall.
- Isintok Dam Spillway Upgrade The Isintok Lake recreation site will be closed to the public until November during construction of the Isintok Dam Spillway.
- Prairie Valley Road from Cartwright Avenue to Morrow Avenue This
  project includes repaving Prairie Valley Road from Cartwright Avenue to
  Morrow Avenue, adding a multi-use path, and replacing the existing
  watermain originally installed in 1940. Construction is planned to begin in
  the fall of 2024 or spring of 2025.

#### **Invasive trees**

Invasive trees are the biggest invaders in the neighbourhood! They can wreak havoc with our sewers and foundations. Some species reach heights of up to 25 metres and are a point of contention between many neighbours. There are FOUR species of concern in Summerland: tree-of-heaven, Siberian elm, Russian olive and Black locust.



All of these species provide shade, habitat and may be considered pleasant-looking trees. But those redeeming qualities are outweighed by their aggressive expansion into natural areas and neighbouring properties. Tree-of-heaven and Siberian elm also support invasive insects that can invade homes or threaten the agriculture and forest industries.

How to control? Seedlings can be hand-pulled when the soil is moist. Mature trees may be controlled using herbicide treatment. Bulldozing, mowing, girdling and brush cutting can also be effective, but require many consecutive years of treatment. Anyone dealing with invasive trees should consult a professional. #### Potential asbestos concerns

Any structure such as a home or business built before 1990 could contain asbestos as it was widely used in common building materials including:

- Drywall, plaster board, stucco and cement siding
- Vinyl flooring and leveling compound
- Ceiling tiles
- Insulation including vermiculite and spray foam

It is the responsibility of anyone depositing renovation or demolition material at the Summerland Landfill to prove that the materials they are hauling do not contain asbestos. If material does contain asbestos, it must be properly sealed for asbestos disposal. The District of Summerland has created a webpage to assist residents doing renovation or demolition projects that will be bringing waste to the landfill. #### School zone safety reminders

The roads are now busier than ever with school back in session. The District is providing some important reminders for drivers to slow down and take care when they are in school zones. This includes:

- Watch for children especially near crosswalks and intersections;
- don't make U-turns in a school zone;
- don't stop in a "no stopping" zone, no matter how quick you think you are;
- vehicles approaching from both directions must stop for school buses when their red lights are flashing;
- always have your children enter or exit vehicle onto sidewalk side of car;
- never allow children to cross mid-block; and
- if a vehicle is stopped in front of you or the lane next to you, they may be yielding for a pedestrian. Be prepared to stop.
