Message from Council

The hottest days of summer 2021 (and did it EVER get hot!) are behind us now, and parents, students, educators and staff of Summerland schools are gearing up for the 2021/22 school year. The cooler and—we hope—wetter weather should help with the wildfires burning around us and throughout BC and people who have had to leave their homes can return to rebuild some semblance of normalcy.

Council and CAO Statt will be attending the Union of BC Municipalities (UBCM) convention this month. The Convention is an excellent opportunity to network with elected officials throughout the province, debate on resolutions submitted by local governments, attend seminars and workshops on a variety of matters, and meet with Ministers and/or Ministry staff on topics of particular concern to the District of Summerland. Due to COVID-19, the 2021 Convention will (again) be held virtually. As usual, there will be only one day of Council meetings in September (September 27).

The August 2021 Message from Council closed with a mention that Step 4 of the Restart Plan was just a month away. However, with the August 24 announcement that masks are once again mandatory in all public places throughout the province, at the time of writing this Message it appears that Step 4 (scheduled for September 7) may be postponed.

What has *not* changed is Council's appreciation of Summerland residents and business owners who are following public health protocols, getting vaccinated and protecting others in our community and beyond. This is the only way forward—the only way we can challenge COVID-19 and its emerging variants. Stay strong, Summerland.

The District of Summerland currently has openings on two committees: the Board of Variance and the Water Advisory Committee. The Board of Variance meets only when required to make decisions on minor development variance applications where compliance with regulations would cause undue hardship. The Water Advisory Committee makes recommendations to Council regarding water issues — including the upcoming review of the Water Master Plan, Water Emergency Response Policy, and the Drought Management Plan.

Applications are available at www.summerland.ca/your-city-hall/committees (or at Municipal Hall) and must be submitted to corporateofficer@summerland.ca by October 1, 2021. Council will review all applications and decide on appointments.

Sewer main and hydrant flushing

The District of Summerland is performing annual sewer main and hydrant flushing throughout Summerland until the end of October. Annual maintenance ensures that sewer mains and hydrants are working properly. Please use caution when driving by crews working on the road.



Short term rental regulation review

As the use of residential dwellings in Summerland for short-term rentals are becoming more common through the use of platforms such as Airbnb and VRBO, the District is looking to review its policies on renting out a dwelling for short-term



stays. Summerland's zoning bylaw currently does not allow any short term rentals, only registered bed and breakfast businesses with property owners present and guests staying within the home. Staff will be seeking feedback from the community on this topic in upcoming months. BC Energy Step Code and Building Bylaw review

Over the next few months, District staff will be engaging with the building community and the general public on the potential implementation of the BC Energy Step Code and a review of the District's Building Bylaw. The BC Energy Step Code works to reduce the amount of energy required for all new buildings being constructed. Through this program, local governments can choose to mandate that new buildings in their jurisdiction meet specific levels, or "steps". Summerland community recreation & health centre project

The District of Summerland continues to plan for the replacement of the Summerland Aquatic & Fitness Centre and explore the inclusion of a Primary Health Care Centre. A **Recreation Centre** Feasibility and Site Fit Study is currently underway considering two potential sites: current site on the Summerland Secondary School property and Summerland Arena property.

A Primary Health Care Centre Feasibility Study is also taking place in tandem which will consider the Recreation Centre sites as well as looking at the feasibility of other sites in downtown Summerland. Biosolid compost is valued for its high organic matter content and strong structure that drains easily and promotes healthy root growth. The Class A government designation means that the product can be sold with no restrictions. It can be safely applied to lawns, flowers, shrubs and gardens. Applying District of Summerland Compost in the fall will prepare your yard for next year — replenishing the nutrients lost during the growing season!

Summerland remains in Stage 2 Water Restrictions but asks that all residents continue to voluntarily reduce their water use as much as possible to help avoid further mandatory restrictions. Annual property tax sale September 27, 2021 at 10:00 am Council Chambers, 13211 Henry Ave


Each year, on the last Monday of September, municipalities are required to have a tax sale of all properties with three years of outstanding property taxes.
