
The 118th Union of B.C. Municipalities (UBCM) Convention is over for another year. This year's theme was "Obstacles to Opportunities". Panel discussions and resolutions reflected matters that are top-of-mind in local governments across the province: attainable housing, reconciliation, health matters (mental health, COVID-19 and the opioid crisis), climate action, and post-pandemic economic recovery. Summerland Council had meetings with the Ministers and staff of Agriculture, Food and Fisheries; Municipal Affairs; and Jobs, Economic Recovery and Innovation.

UBCM was a virtual Convention again this year and, while the improvement in format and use of interactive and responsive technology was amazing, nothing compares to being able to meet in person. So much relationship-building and sharing of ideas and solutions happens outside of the formal sessions; Council is looking forward to a face-to-face Convention in September 2022.

The September newsletter message from Council contemplated that, given the rising COVID-19 case counts and hospitalizations in the Province, perhaps Step 4 of the B.C. Restart Plan might be postponed. Sadly, this contemplation was realized and, although we may be 'done' with the pandemic, it is not done with us. Thankfully, those who have potentially put themselves and their families in harms way are not done either. This month, Council would like to especially direct our respect and appreciation to the women and men who work in health care; educate or support the education of children; care for the elderly or vulnerable; provide public safety and emergency services; grow, deliver, and/or sell food; or ensure we have clean water, reliable electrical services and sanitary services. Water storage and restrictions

The Summerland (Trout Creek) Water System has approximately 50% of its storage remaining as of September 14. Below is an updated trigger graph from the Summerland Drought Response Plan which plays a part in the decision making for drought levels and water use stages. This graph includes 2021 data and a cross section of other years for comparison. The Trout Creek graph shows that storage levels remain in Drought level 1. The Garnett System remains at approximately 77% storage. Summerland's Water Use is now at Stage 1.

Giant's Head Mountain Park Road is now open until October 31, 2021. The road and gate will open at 12 noon and close at 9:00PM every day except Sundays.

Be Bear Smart

Bears are preparing for their winter slumber. Garbage, bird feeders, and tree fruits can attract bears to your yard, family, and neighbourhood. Once a bear becomes used to human food sources it becomes habituated, usually resulting in the bear being destroyed. It is important to keep wildlife wild and communities safe.



Tips to prevent attracting bears to your property:

Garbage - properly secure your garbage and keep it indoors until pick-up or until you can bring it to the landfill. Place your carts at the curb no earlier than 5:00AM on your scheduled collection day. Consider upgrading to a wildlife cart.

Compost- use finished compost, leaves, grass or wood chips to cover up fruit or other food waste in your composter. Properly care for your compost by turning it and layering it appropriately to reduce odours.

Fruit trees and grapes - make sure to harvest fruit immediately. Remove all windfall fruit. If you own an orchard, electric fencing is encouraged.

Pet food, birdfeeders, and gardens are all attractants for bears. Keep your pet food securely stored indoors. Bring your birdfeeders in for the summer, as an alternative, plant natural flowers as a food source instead.

Barbeques - everyone loves the smell of a good barbeque, bears included! To keep your barbeques safe, make sure that they are properly cleaned, covered and don't leave utensils out overnight.

BC Energy Step Code and Building Bylaw review

Energy savings for heating—setting your thermostat

In winter, heating costs can go up by as much as 140% compared to the rest of the year. One of the most effective things you can do to control your heating costs is to manage your thermostat effectively. A programmable thermostat is a small investment that can help you manage your heating costs by reducing wasted heat. Simply set it to turn on at the times you're home and turn down when you're out during the day and at night when you're sleeping.

Setting your thermostat at the right temperature is important.

- * Heating costs rise about 5% for every degree above 20°C (68°F) that you set your thermostat.
- * 16°C when you're away from home and sleeping.
- * 21°C when you're relaxing or watching TV.
- * 18°C when you're cooking or doing housework.

Set it and forget it. Set your thermostat to adjust at certain times of the day for when you're asleep or at work. Have your thermostat warm up right before you usually get home in the evening.

Manage settings on the go. If you make spontaneous evening plans and have a WiFi-enabled smart thermostat, adjust it right from your smartphone.

Do you have baseboard heating or rely on portable space heaters? They can be inefficient, especially for large spaces. Make sure you're using yours as efficiently as possible. Visit BC Hydro power smart.

'Smart' thermostat "learn your routine." Thermostats like the Nest will learn your daily routine and automatically adjust the temperature for you.



Did you know you can purchase high quality, sustainable, and safe Class A biosolid compost at the Summerland Sanitary Landfill? Biosolid compost is valued for its high organic matter content and strong structure that drains easily and promotes healthy root growth. The Class A government designation means that the product can be sold with no restrictions. It can be safely applied to restore lawns, overwinter trees and shrubs, plant fall bulbs and tubers, or re-nourish spent gardens. Applying District of Summerland Compost in the fall will prepare your yard for next year replenishing the nutrients lost during the growing season!
