

Sidewalk clearing

Municipal bylaws require that you remove the snow and ice from public footpaths and sidewalks bordering your property (business or residential). Any snow or ice that accumulates before noon must be removed by noon that day. If it snows in the afternoon, you have until noon of the next day to remove it. Failure to do so could result in the District having the sidewalk cleaned at your expense. We ask that you use a de-icing agent





The District of Summerland curbside collection contractor will make every attempt to empty curbside carts during winter conditions. However, their top priority is resident and employee safety.

In the event of a collection delay:

- Contact Waste Connections of Canada at 250-490-3888 to see when any missed collection for your property will be collected
- To avoid animals getting into waste, bring in carts overnight
- When service is resumed, the contractor will collect any extra accumulated material, at no extra charge, equivalent to the amount that would have been collected if service had not been temporarily interrupted.

Battery disposal

Please take your used batteries to the Landfill Recycling Depot for free recycling. Smaller household batteries can also be recycled at the businesses listed below. Used batteries are extremely dangerous and should never be



placed in your garbage or recycling carts. They can easily cause explosions, fires, or harm to workers.

<u>Call2Recycle.ca</u> depots for household batteries in Summerland include Home Hardware, The Source, Pharmasave, and the Summerland Bottle Depot.

Project updates

Dale Meadows watermain and road improvements — Phase 1 of this project from the Dale Meadows Park entrance to Gould Road has been substantially completed with minor trail connection improvements through Dale Meadows



Park to be completed in the new year when the weather warms up. We thank everyone for your patience during completion of this project.



Victoria Road South stormwater replacement and multi-use pathway installation project — Storm system replacement and paving of the northern portion of this project has been completed, with the southern portion extending to Agur Road to be completed in Spring 2024. You may notice that the section of road that was paved appears to be a bit lower than

the curb. This was done intentionally as the top lift of asphalt will be placed upon completion of the full project in 2024, leaving a uniform, seamless finish. Thank you to everyone for your patience during this project.

Solar Project — The Summerland Energy Centre is in the final stages of commissioning and testing. Since connecting the solar panels in late October, the panels have generated 38,562 kWh of energy as of November 27, which is equivalent to the energy used by 42 Summerland homes for one month.

Snow removal

District staff are on standby seven days a week to provide essential services to our residents. Please help our snow removal crew by parking your vehicle(s) off the road when possible. When clearing your driveway, stockpile snow



on the right side when facing the road and not onto roadways. This prevents the snow you removed from being ploughed back in front of your driveway. Heavy snow days and equipment failures can affect the delivery of snow removal services, priority routes are focused on first (e.g. school bus routes), then other streets. We appreciate your cooperation and patience as we work diligently to clear our roads throughout the winter. Your cooperation and patience are appreciated!



Invasive plants lurk beneath the snow

Did you know that many species of invasive plants happily lie beneath the snow waiting for spring? Winter annuals such as cheatgrass germinate in the fall and grow during



any brief spell of warm weather, but otherwise remain dormant during the winter. Perennials can live for several years and survive the winter by storing food in their roots. For example, Dalmatian toadflax seemingly dies back in the late fall, but new buds appear before winter. Toadflax sprouts when temperatures rise in late winter or early spring. While winter doesn't give us the opportunity to get out and clip, mow or pull these undesirable plants, it does give us time to do some research on these invaders and plan for the new year. Winter home heating tips

You may find your electricity bill going up during the winter months.

Increased heating and other winter energy habits (such as using more lighting for longer hours), can make the average winter electricity bill 66% higher than the rest of the year. There are some steps you can take to heat your home more efficiently and help you avoid high winter bills.

Baseboard heating

If your home has baseboard heaters you're likely already aware that they can be costly to run. In fact, they can account for up to 50% of your home's overall electricity use. Thankfully with a few simple tips — like turning them off in rooms you're not using, keeping them at an ideal temperature, and ensuring they're kept clean, can help keep your costs down.

Draftproofing your home

A drafty home is an inefficiently-heated home. If your home is losing warm air to the outside and letting cold air gust in, you're wasting heat. Sealing gaps and cracks can help, reducing heat loss by up to 10%. Plus, it's a simple job that only involves a little bit of work.

- Apply weatherstripping
- Check for drafts in your home
- Install outlet and switch insulator pads

It's also important to use window coverings effectively to minimize heat loss during the winter.

Using a space heater

Most portable space heaters use a lot of electricity so if the room you're trying to heat is large, or you have multiple heaters in multiple rooms, they can quickly rack up your bill.

To make the most of a portable heater, follow these tips:

- Use it in a small or enclosed space
- Place it in the corner of the room
- Keep doors to the room closed to keep the heat in
- Turn it off when you leave the room

No matter what kind of space heater you're using, it's important to keep safety top of mind. Ensure it won't tip over, use it on a level floor, keep blankets and fabric away, and never go to sleep with the heater on.
