Reduce Your **Wasteline**



The District of Summerland is proud to recognize Waste Reduction Week in Canada (Oct. 17 – 23) and to affirm our commitment to reducing waste, conserving resources, and educating our community about sustainable living.

Right now, our community sends over 11,000 tonnes of material to the landfill annually – that's almost 1,000 kg of trash for every single resident! Solid waste is a large source of methane, a powerful greenhouse gas (GHG) that is particularly impactful in the short-term, and which represents almost 18% of our total GHG emissions in Summerland. More trash being landfilled means more costs to you, the taxpayer.

It's easy to reduce your waste and leave a cleaner world for future generations. Here's what you can do to **take action today**:

Use a Clear Bag for Recycling – only clear blue or clear bags must be used. Accepted recyclable items should be placed loosely in the clear blue or clear bags. Grocery bags are not accepted in your curbside recycling - they must be dropped at the landfill.

Recycle Right – be sure that only accepted materials go in your curbside recycling bag. Incorrectly sorted items can cause an entire batch of otherwise recyclable materials to be landfilled, and contaminated batches cause costs to rise. If in doubt, leave it out!

Recycle More – items that cannot go in your clear recycling bag but can be dropped at the landfill for FREE include: glass bottles & jars, plastic foam packaging, plastic bags (grocery, dry cleaning, etc.), overwrap, plastic films, appliances, e-waste, household hazardous waste (paints, pesticides, solvents, aerosols, etc.), batteries, fluorescent light tubes, wood waste, propane tanks, oil, oil containers, oil filters and more. Close the Loop – look for products that are made from recycled or post-consumer materials, and ask the retailers that you shop at to stock items with recycled content and minimal packaging.

Become a Precycler – prevent waste before it's created! Buy only what you need, compost when you can, and think about how items can be repaired, donated, or reused rather than thrown away or recycled.

Every Bit Counts - zero waste is possible! By considering each item before throwing it away, you can dramatically reduce your waste and preserve our precious natural resources. Here are some easy ways to reduce your impact:

- bring reusable bags and containers when shopping, travelling, or packing lunches or leftovers
- stop receiving flyers & other 'junk' by contacting Canada Post to opt out of receiving unwanted mail
- purchase items such as dish soap and laundry detergents in concentrate forms
- say no to straws, disposable cutlery, unneeded copies of receipts, and other short-use products
- use rechargeable batteries or solar chargers for electronics

Council will hold a Public Hearing on Tuesday, October 11th at 7pm in Council Chambers at Municipal Hall regarding a Zoning Bylaw Amendment (Water Zoning Regulations) Bylaw No. 2016-028.

The purpose of this bylaw is to consider adding water zoning regulations to the zoning bylaw to control land use along the foreshore and out to the municipal boundary in Okanagan Lake. This will regulate docks, mooring buoys and use of the lake for recreational purposes.
