Power Outages in October—Be Prepared

The District of Summerland has planned two power outages in order to upgrade electrical switches at the Prairie Valley Substation. These porcelain switches break down over time and become brittle and will be replaced with more durable epoxy switches.

To perform this work, two 6 hour power outages will occur in Summerland (excluding Trout Creek, Front Bench and Canyon View areas) as follows:

Sunday morning, October 15, 2017 from 12:01am - 6:00am Sunday morning, October 22, 2017 from 12:01am - 6:00am

The work must be done and these times are expected to cause the least disruption. Residents are given notice to be prepared.

- Make sure you have working flashlights available, back up alarm clocks and anything else you may need.
- A full freezer should stay cold up to 1-2 days providing the door remains closed. A cooler or fridge will keep food cold for 4 hours.
- Avoid having meat, poultry or fish or other perishable items in your refrigerator during these scheduled times.
- Keep the doors closed as much as possible to keep food cold longer.
- Interior Health recommends food in a fridge should be kept under 4° Celsius and frozen food must be at −18° Celsius. When in doubt, throw it out.

Busy Week for Council at UBCM...

Summerland's Mayor, council and CAO attended the Union of British Columbia Municipalities (UBCM) convention to participate in workshops and seminars on topics of interest to local government and to meet with provincial cabinet ministers to discuss issues and initiatives specifically related to Summerland.

Mayor Waterman and council met with the Minister of Education where stabilizing funding levels for education in rural communities was stressed.

The importance of continued infrastructure funding programs was discussed with the Minister of Municipal Affairs who also holds the portfolio for Affordable Housing. Council informed the minister that a report on Affordable Housing framework in Summerland will be presented in October.

Council met with the Minister of Agriculture to explain the progress that has been made to date on the proposal for a South Okanagan Agricultural Innovation Centre in Summerland. The Ministry is contributing \$25,000 towards the development of a business plan for that project.

A meeting was held with the Minister of Tourism and Arts & Culture to bring awareness to the economic development benefits the KVR Steam Train brings to Summerland. Council also discussed their investment into the Arts and Culture Centre at the former library site. Support was requested for both of these initiatives vital to Summerland.

The Minister of Energy, Mines and Petroleum Resources and her staff expressed a great deal of interest in Summerland's proposed utility-scale Integrated Solar project and requested more information regarding Summerland's initiative to include an energy storage component to the project.

Council met with the Minister of FLNRO and Rural Development to urge the provincial government to continue the Rural Dividend funding program. Over the past two years, the District has initiated projects such as the Economic Development project (signage, communication and Ag-Tech research) and the first phase of the Integrated Solar Project with funds from this program. In partnership with the Rotary Club of Summerland, the District has an application pending for Giants Head Trails redevelopment. Council was informed that it is expected that the results of this intake of grants will be announced soon.

Additional discussions with provincial staff were held regarding the importance of infrastructure funding for projects such as the Flume Intake and the status of the application for the Giant's Head Road and Infrastructure Improvement project.

What's Happening....

Jones Flat and Garnet Valley **Water System Separation Project Update**

Watermain installation and service connections are continuing on Garnet Valley Road north of Wildhorse and is expected to be complete by mid-October. Paving from the pumphouse up to Wildhorse Road is expected to be



completed the first week of October. Following this, road construction will continue north of Wildhorse Road following the watermain installation. The final section of paving from Wildhorse Road to the end of the project limits is expected by the end of October.

Hydrant Flushing

The Works Division is flushing hydrants from 7:30 am to 3:00 pm, Monday to Friday until the end of October. This annual maintenance ensures that hydrants are in good working condition in case of emergencies. Residents may experience lower than normal water flow for a short period of time when flushing is being performed in

your area. This may also cause water to be discoloured, if this occurs, please run a cold water tap or an outside hose until water runs clear. Avoid using your washing machine from 7:30 am to 3:00 pm as discoloured water can stain clothes.

Sewer Main Flushing Continues

The Works Division is performing annual sewer main flushing throughout Summerland from 7:00 am to 3:00 pm, Monday to Friday until the end of October. This annual maintenance ensures that sewer mains are working properly. Please use caution when driving by Crews working on the road.

Fall Irrigation Shut Off

Irrigation shut off is scheduled to commence Tuesday, October 10, 2017. If you require an extension, please visit the Works and Utilities office at 9215 Cedar Avenue to complete an application form and submit a \$44.00 non-refundable fee (cash or cheque) no later than Friday, October 6, 2017. Styrofoam contains polystyrene which is flammable and contains a multitude of harmful chemicals, making it one of the most challenging items to recycle or reuse.
